There is little doubt that, globally, dealing with COVID-19 this past year, has been difficult, especially for families faced with multiple stressors, including isolation and loneliness, physical and psychological health risks, school closures, loss of employment and loss of financial resources. Incidents of family violence have skyrocketed across the world and here, at home in our community, lock downs and public health restrictions have made it exceptionally difficult for victims of family violence to reach out for help despite available services. In the face of this shadow pandemic, new light has been shone on the prevalence of family violence, resulting in more individuals reaching out for help on behalf of someone experiencing abuse at home.

As The Today Centre shifted to remote work, Family Violence Specialists met with individuals over the phone or virtually while workshops moved away from in-person delivery to virtual platforms. "Going Digital" saw The Today Centre capitalizing on many service enhancements, such as implementing a Secure Chat feature on our website to allow individuals another form of access to services, serving clients outside of Edmonton with greater ease, and broadening our workshop and training reach into rural communities within Alberta and across Canada, at times with international reach.



"Staying Connected" took on new meaning as we delved into joining new networks, developed new partnerships, created new opportunities for community engagement and improved our communication platforms.

The opportunities and accomplishments of the past year would not have been possible without the amazing support of our funders and donors, both new and existing. Board members, volunteers, supporters and community partners have been instrumental in furthering the work of The Today Centre and staff have demonstrated resilience and leadership, as they continue to offer outstanding support, education and service to those interested in, and affected by, family violence.

## **Journey to Safety**



Rihanna's journey through abuse began when she met her husband in Africa. Despite family encouragement to take her time, they married after six months. Leaving behind her family, friends, and a well-paying job, Rihanna joined her husband in Canada. She arrived having limited supports and little knowledge of English. These barriers provided her husband with opportunities to economically and financially abuse her. He fully controlled their finances and wouldn't allow Rihanna access to their joint bank account and income. Her husband isolated her from the outside world, forcing her to stay home to raise his son from his previous marriage. Rihanna was prevented from taking English lessons and obtaining employment. Each time Rihanna confronted her husband about her needs, she was subjected to physical, verbal and emotional abuse. Enduring endless put-downs and name calling, Rihanna's husband also threatened to have her deported from Canada.

In the last incident of physical abuse that Rihanna would experience, she called the police. Sustaining a head injury and being strangled, Rihanna was immediately taken to hospital while her husband was charged. One of the many resources Rihanna was provided by police was The Today Centre. Through the support of a Family Violence Specialist, Rihanna learned more about abuse and available supports in the community. Together, Rihanna and the Family Violence Specialist worked on determining her risk and planning for her safety. Rihanna was connected to financial resources, immigrant support services and shelter. She received a Lives on the Line cell phone to help her more easily connect to services and to help meet her basic needs, a food hamper and grocery gift cards were provided.

When Rihanna's time with The Today Centre ended, she was well on her way to forging a different path for herself. A new chapter to Rhianna's story was just beginning...






