The past year held many accomplishments for The Today Centre. We broadened our reach in the community, forged new partnerships, strengthened our community presence and enhanced program areas to better meet the needs of those who seek our support. We honored our 10th Anniversary and Family Violence Prevention Month by holding our first Help Today, Hope Tomorrow Breakfast in November. We invested in a new brand, affirming where we came from, where we are now and where we are going. This culminated in a well-attended, successful Brand Reveal Party.

Many of these accomplishments seemed impossible at one time.

When we think about those who are subjected to family violence and abuse, it may seem impossible for many to consider reaching out for help. Imagining anything different can seem insurmountable. Success, no matter how small, must be recognized and celebrated.

From the moment a victim of family violence reaches for the phone and asks for help, The Today Centre recognizes success. This past year **456 victims of family violence and their 570 children** reached out for help. Another **814 friends, family, neighbors and service providers sought help** on behalf of someone they knew was experiencing family violence. As we reflect, we need to remember the challenges behind turning yesterday's impossibilities into today's accomplishments.

We are incredibly grateful to new and longstanding funders, donors, partners and supporters who continue to invest in making a difference in the lives of hundreds of people. We are deeply appreciative of our Board of Directors, who tirelessly give their time, energy and commitment to the vision of The Today Centre, and of The Today Centre team, who makes our successes real on a daily basis. Even in the face of many challenges, staff members remain dedicated and passionate about The Today Centre and the individuals we support.

A New Path Forward

Tracy's journey to a life free from violence began in 2016 when she called The Today Centre, asking for help in understanding the qualities of a healthy relationship. Gaining information and feeling empowered, Tracy began a new path knowing it was her right to live free of violence.

Three years later, remembering the support she had received while here, Tracy called again. Enduring horrific violence at the hands of her partner, and a lifetime of trauma across generations, Tracy feared for her life as her partner's release from prison became imminent. Tracy spoke these words when she reached out... "If I don't make it to my first appointment, call the police. He has me. I could be dead."

Tracy and her Family Violence Specialist focused on developing a safety plan and ways Tracy could empower herself, including establishing boundaries, giving herself a voice and intentionally practicing self-care and emotional well-being. For Tracy, this meant she took time for herself, connected with her culture and created goals for herself, all things she had not been able to do for as long as she could remember.

With her time at The Today Centre drawing to an end, Tracy expressed feeling listened to, valued and not judged. With demonstrated strength and resiliency, Tracy's path to living a life free from abuse was forged.




"I have so many resources to help me and it was good to have a safe place to talk about my problems."

#1 Service Delivery

A. Enhance client-centered support and services to those affected by family violence.

With ATB Financial supporting our Toys for Tots with Trauma project, we outfitted our childminding room with sensory and educational toys to help children coming to The Today Centre.

We established our Safety in Motion and Safe at Last initiatives to help alleviate transportation barriers as well as other barriers that keep individuals in unsafe and abusive relationships. Both initiatives as well as Lives on the Line, providing cell phones and minutes, have helped support individuals, with no other financial means, with transportation, gift cards and hotel vouchers.

Valuing inclusivity, safety plans were updated to include gender-neutral language and to consider exceptionally vulnerable populations, such as newcomers and immigrants, Indigenous persons, those who identify as LGBTQ2S+ and individuals with disabilities.

B. Strengthen collaborative partnerships to strengthen client services.

Partnerships and community collaboration took on many forms this year. Touring other agencies helped bridge clients to and from The Today Centre.

For those individuals unable to come to The Today Centre, staff were able to respond to their needs by conducting appointments at new and existing partner organizations within the client's community. A new relationship with St. Francis of Assisi Language Instruction for Newcomers (LINC) allowed immigrant women, in a safe and supportive environment, to attend presentations on healthy relationships.



#2 Education & Training


C. Advance education and training opportunities for practitioners and individuals impacted by family violence through partnerships.

Collaboration on training opportunities for front line service providers continues with Community Initiatives Against Family Violence's **Public Education and Awareness Raising Committee. Family Violence Across the Lifespan** training is possible due to ongoing partnerships with City of Edmonton, Children's Services and Islamic Family and Social Services Association. With United Way of the Alberta Capital Region, the **Cut It Out** program is co-facilitated to salon professionals, teaching them how to recognize signs of family violence and skills to effectively respond. Contributions to **Trauma Informed Edmonton** and **Diverse Voices Conference Steering Committee** ensure additional opportunities to explore topics related to family violence.

#3 Financial Sustainability

D. Increase and diversify revenue streams to maintain operational effectiveness and service delivery.

Additional financial support for our services came through new partnerships with the City of Spruce Grove and the Masonic Foundation of Alberta. With support from Women and Gender Equality, we have been able to build our organizational capacity in the area of community engagement and fund development. Thrilled to host our first **Help Today, Hope Tomorrow Breakfast**, over 150 guests attended and helped reach our goal of 50 individual donations. Our sponsors, Coast Plaza Hotel, SC Systems, Latitude Family Law, Servus Credit Union & Wild Orchid Boutique Florist, helped make our breakfast a success. Special thanks to Telus Community Ambassadors, Alberta Blue Cross Hearts of Blue, Edmonton Food Bank and Jessalyn King Studios for their generous in-kind support throughout the year!

#4 Awareness & Advocacy

E. Promote awareness of the Today Family Violence Help Centre and its services with service providers and the community.

The Today Centre is proud to be involved in many networks and initiatives, including Community Initiatives Against Family Violence, Ethno-cultural Family Violence Committee, Alberta Association of Immigrant Serving Agencies and IMPACT, the provincial collective impact initiative to eradicate domestic and sexual violence.

Through a variety of strategies, including social media, newsletters, events, community gatherings, inter-agency collaboration, public education and resource fairs, we continue to increase awareness of The Today Centre. We look forward to the year ahead as we seek to build our capacity in multi-media communication and reaching more broadly into the community.

F. Advance the work of The Today Family Violence Help Centre by developing and maintaining strong relationships with other service providers, funders, donors, and all levels of government.

Working with The Met Agency, The Today Centre invested in rebranding, resulting in a new visual identity and website. We hosted a successful Brand Reveal Party and were humbled to have many community partners, donors, volunteers and supporters come out to share this milestone. Our easyto-navigate website and print materials, including TODAY booklets, resource cards and pamphlets, are helpful tools for those seeking information on services and community resources.

This year, as always, The Today Centre was incredibly grateful for the support of its many wonderful volunteers and ambassadors of the agency. Board members, committee members, program and Casino volunteers all played a vital role in the work being done to support victims of family violence.
